But Why: Adventures! Northeast Nature | DECEMBER: SOLSTICE

DRIVING QUESTION:

How do our longest or shortest days of the year inspire cultural traditions and celebrations?

Objectives: Students will

- Understand the concept of the winter solstice and its significance.
- Understand and appreciate diverse cultural associations with the winter solstice.

Activities:

- 1. Teach students the concept of mindfulness and its benefits for mental well-being.
- 2. Engage them in a short mindfulness exercise before taking them outside.
- 3. After the mindfulness activity, take students on a nature walk. Encourage them to notice smells, textures, sights and sounds.

Draw the sun and moon's interaction.

Create a picture of the two interacting. Is the sun higher or the moon? Is it daylight, nighttime or both?

Web Quest

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WEB QUEST: Many cultures across the world celebrate the winter solstice in some way. It's important to honor and learn from each other's traditions. To do this, let's find out more using safe searches and audio as a way of recording what we have learned.

Do a safe search by choosing key words for the search. Find a server you trust. Words like "solstice" or "traditions" might work as a start.

Safe Search Tips:

- 1. Don't click on items that look like advertisements.
- 2. Make sure website names are spelled correctly.
- 3. Check to see if the website you access is secure by looking for the lock image in the search bar.

Next...

- 1. Audio record your sources, title, authors or website. It is important to share your source.
- 2. Share a summary about what you learned about. Talk to your teacher to see if you should write this out formally before recording it.
- 3. Share with your teacher or team as a MP4 file.

Solstice

[SOUL-stiss] • noun

The time when the earth's hemispheres are tilted as close and as far away from the sun as they get. The winter solstice has the shortest daylight of the year and the summer solstice has the longest amount of daylight. The winter solstice marks the exact moment when half of earth is tilted the farthest away from the sun.

Hemisphere

[HEM-iss-feer] • noun

Half the earth. The earth can be divided into northern and southern hemispheres or by eastern and western hemispheres.

Temperature

[TEM-pruh-choor] • noun

A measurement of how hot or cold something is.

Dormant

[DORE-mint] • adjective

When physical functions or activities are temporarily slowed down.
